"Transparency." Often promised, not always practiced. Transparency between City Hall and residents is foundational to a relationship of trust – and is a sign of good governance, proving that your city hides nothing from you.

True transparency is a campaign pledge that I make to you. Among other protections, I propose creating a Sunshine Ordinance that would apply across City Hall, from employees to the Council, and to all Commissions.

Sunshine Ordinance - Protection in Perpetuity

Put a Sunshine Ordinance before voters. Once passed, its protections apply not only to the sitting council, but to all future councils – in perpetuity. It strengthens state laws to make meetings, records, votes, deliberations, and other official actions available for public observation, participation, and inspection.

Gives the public rights of access to government information without delay (project progress and budgets are posted online, policy changes decided in open meetings)

Creates internal checks and balances in government operations

(longer records retention period, make public documents easily accessed on city website - contrast with Encinitas' policy)

Requires accountability for city officials regarding transparency issues (minimal closed-session meetings, auditors must answer public's questions at budget hearings)

Make Decision-Making Transparent

Good decision making takes due diligence and does not have an assumed outcome. Poor decision making has a predetermined outcome, hidden agenda, and lack of open review. Recent examples include:

Hwy. 101 lane reductions in downtown Encinitas, where many business owners were not asked for their input before physical changes were made. *I will take the time to do it right.*

17 cycling accidents in **3** months on S. Cardiff 101 cycle lanes, installed despite warnings of design flaws and safety issues. *I* will not decide my position in advance of a vote, but will listen first.

Closed-session meetings held over a year in advance of council approval of the Saxony safe homeless parking lot with no notification until the last minute to adjacent neighbors. *I oppose the secretive process, not the homeless.*

Code updates hidden from public, yet approved by Council that enabled the 7-story, 283-unit Goodson project in Olivenhain to avoid a traffic study and environmental review. *I will never adjust the rules to favor special interests.*

My passion for transparency in government extends beyond Encinitas.

I belong to a <u>statewide group</u> of mayors and council members working to retain local zoning control and push back on state housing mandates. We are making headway in influencing Sacramento.

I sit on the board of <u>Spotlight on Coastal Corruption</u> (SOCC), a group that <u>successfully sued</u> five California Coastal Commissioners for violating ex-parte disclosure laws. The suit is pending further action, as SOCC refuses to take money from taxpayers to cover the violators' fines.

Locally, my work citywide includes a wide variety of projects and topics from affordable housing, to downtown alcohol-related issues, to preservation of the Beacons Beach switchback trail. I led the Prop A vote to passage in 2013 to ensure that residents always have a voice on development that impacts their community and quality of life.
